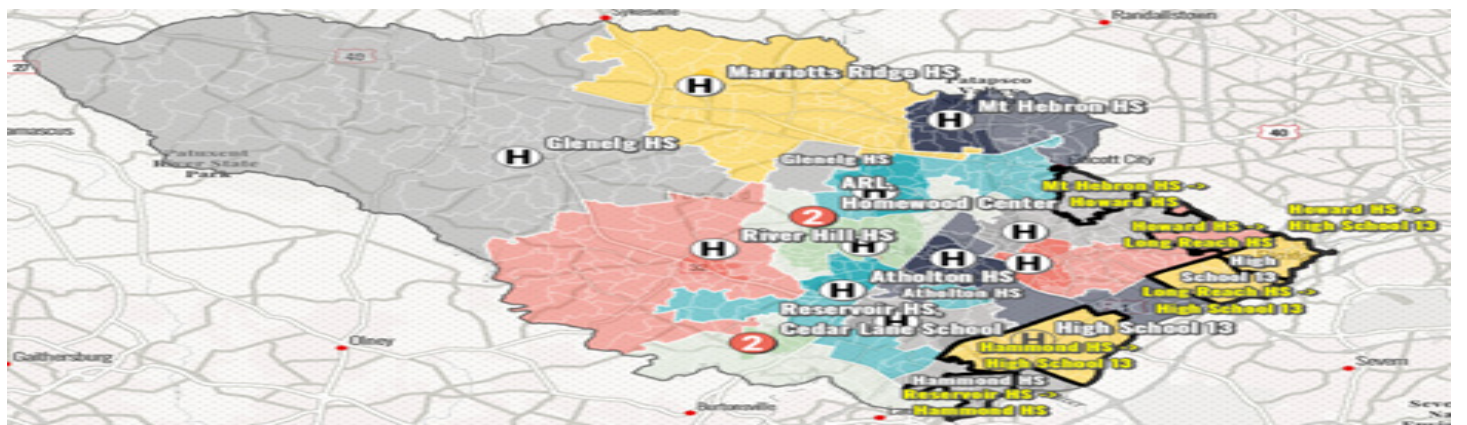

This past November, the Howard County Board of Education solidified the redistricting plan and announced specifics about High School 13 for the 2023-2024 school year. Situated in Jessup, High School 13 will receive students from Hammond, Howard, and Long Reach High Schools. Students will be moved from Mount Hebron to Howard High School, Howard

to Long Reach High School, and Reservoir to Hammond High School. However, there are multiple exemptions to the redistricting that students are able to use in order to opt-out of being redistricted.

Current 10th and 11th grade students who have been redistricted have the option to continue attending their current school and opt-in for HCPSS provided transportation. Current 9th grade students who have

been redistricted to a pre-existing school will also have the option to stay at their current school and opt-in for HCPSS transportation whereas those who have been redistricted to High School 13 do not have this exemption. Siblings of students that are exempt from redistricting and have shared one year together in the school they are being redistricted from are also exempt and able to opt-in for HCPSS transportation. Stu-

dents with an IEP or 504 plan in place as of November 17, 2022 are also exempt and are able to opt-in for HCPSS transportation.

Upon opening, High School 13 will only have 9th and 10th grade classes. Elective classes offered will be determined by student demand. Although the name is still undecided due to HCPSS school naming policy, the name will be related to local geographical features.

The Global Impact of the Ukrainian Conflict

Over the past year, it has been very easy to think of the war in Ukraine as a far off conflict that only impacts eastern Europe. Unfortunately, that's just not true. The war in Ukraine has impacted many lives. Some impacts are big, some are small, but none of them are

good.

At the beginning of this conflict, there was a sharp increase in gas prices. This was due to the international sanctioning and embargo of Russian natural gas which makes up a large part of what becomes the gas used for cars. This caused gas prices to rise to nearly \$5.00 per gallon in some

areas. Continuing with rising prices, the embargo of Russian natural gas has caused a spike in electricity prices throughout Europe. Some countries are feeling its effects so severely that citizens are cutting all power in their house while they sleep to cut prices.

While price increases have been

serious, it pales in comparison to the very real threat of violence to those living outside Ukraine. Over the past months, wartime violence has expanded past the borders of Ukraine and gone as far as Ireland. Just last month, two missiles hit the small Polish village of Przewodow (*continued on page 9*)

Educationdata.org has reported that the average college student pays between \$25,000 and \$44,000 per year. That price excludes dormitory living essentials, meal plans, books, and all other expenses not covered in tuition. Most people do not have that much money lying around to spend

on school, but the majority of employers require a college degree. So, what can be done to lower the price of education?

While loans are an option, they take forever to pay off and interest increases annually. Free money is the best way to go, which can be found through scholarships. If you already got a scholarship to your school, congratulations! But, one scholarship may not cover everything, and FAFSA never gives enough. So, here are some scholarship options that you may want to check out.

1. **ScholarshipOwl NO ESSAY Scholarship**

This scholarship, as described, does not require an essay. Throughout the course of the year, 50 applicants will receive a scholarship of \$50,000. It never hurts to apply.

2. **Live Mas Scholarship by**

Taco Bell

Taco Bell has a scholarship that can be worth up to \$25,000! All you have to do is submit a two-minute or less video addressing the questions on their website.

3. **Arthur M. and Berdena King Eagle Scout Scholarship**

This scholarship is open to all Eagle Scouts interested in the American Revolution. Eligible scouts can receive up to \$10,000. The Eagle Scout Scholarship does require an essay, as well as a four-generation ancestor chart.

4. **Big Future Scholarship**

The Big Future Scholarship is a no-essay scholarship available to all high school seniors. Amounts vary but can be up to \$40,000. It is through College Board, so you should already have an account ready! They announce winners monthly, so make sure to apply!

5. **Thiel High School Fellowship**

This scholarship is one for those who enjoy engineering. 20-30 applicants will receive \$100,000 through the two-year fellowship. This would require you to skip two years of college to work on the fellowship, so it is a lot to consider, but you would get paid \$100,000 over the two years and a potential job after. If you are unsure if college is right for you, this may be the perfect opportunity!

6. **Diller Teen Tikun Olam Awards**

The Helen Diller Family Foundation is handing out 15 \$36,000 awards to Jewish teens who show strong leadership and are currently serving in a leadership position to better the world. The deadline is January 5, 2023, for interested applicants.

Kwanzaa

An Overview of the Holiday

Every year, from December 26th to January 1st, Kwanzaa commences. The cultural holiday spans seven days, each having its meaning and purpose in allowing African-Americans and Pan-Africans to celebrate and embrace their African heritage. Many of you may not know about Kwanzaa since it's a reasonably new holiday, founded in 1966 by Maulana Karenga. Karenga was a black nationalist who wanted unity within his community after the Watts Rebellion, a six-day riot in South Central Los Angeles between the black community and police.

The actual name of the seven day holiday originates from the Swahili phrase: "matunda ya kwanza," which translates to first fruits. The seven days consist of: Umoja, meaning unity, Kujichagulia, translating to self-determination, Ujima, referring to responsibility, Ujamaa, focusing on cooperative economics, Nia, which is purpose, Kumba, centered around creativity,

and Imani, which is all about faith. These days can also be referred to as the seven principles and emphasize self-actualization and community cooperation between those who celebrate. The seven days also have corresponding gifts with mazao (crops), mkeka (mat), kinara (candleholder), muhindi (corn), kikombe cha umoja (unity cup), zawadi (gifts), and the mishumaa

saba, which are seven candles arranged on the table, three red, three green, and one black. The three colors

are also the theme of the holiday, so families tend to decorate their houses with those colors and dress in matching dashikis, or their respective African clothing. The black candle represents Umoja or unity, said to be the base of all success, so it's lit on the first day of the celebration. The celebration of Kwanzaa also requires Karamu, a feast on

the final day that includes African and African-American dishes, such as; jambalaya, gumbo, groundnut stew and stewed black eyed peas. All of the original names of the components of the holiday stem from Swahili, an originally East African language that has spread throughout Africa and the Middle East. Additionally, the traditions of the holiday are drawn from



West and East African harvest festivals.

Kwanzaa has drawn its own culture too, with songs like "Happy Kwanzaa" by Teddy Pendergrass, "7 The Kwanzaa Song" by Kwanzaa Gospel Chorus, "Merry Christmas/Happy Kwanzaa" by Stevie Wonder and "Kwanzaa" by Headhunters. The holiday also has its own seven quintessential folktales matching with the seven principles and their messages. The story of "Anansi and his Sons" go with Umoja, "The

Three Tests" match Kujichagulia, "The Great Drum" with Ujima, "The Feast" with Ujamaa, "The Name of the Tree" with Nia, "Anansi Writes a Song" with Kuumba and "The Collared Cow" with Imani. Most of the modern cultural celebrations are still heavily inspired by Africa, such as the tribal dancing and drumming that commences at Kwanzaa.

Gifts are given for the holiday, with most being homemade, educational, or from black-owned businesses. Contrary to what you may believe, this holiday doesn't replace Christmas for those who celebrate, as it's more of a racial-cultural experience than religious or commercial. The celebration of Kwanzaa is also open to anyone who wishes to appreciate African culture, which surprises many, likely explaining why only 4% of Americans celebrate the holiday. I hope this article and other forms of information spreading about the deep-rooted and prideful holiday bring more people to celebrate.

voted Jews with insufficient weapons defeated one of the strongest armies on Earth. They took back control of the Holy Temple in Jerusalem and recommitted it to God’s service. They miraculously lit the menorah, and the oil that was meant to last for one day ended up lasting for eight. The shamash is one of the menorah’s nine flames and is used to light the other eight candles. By Hanukkah’s seventh night, all eight lights are kindled.

As reported by the Christian History Institute, Sweden, Norway, and the Swedish-speaking regions of Finland all celebrate *St. Lucia’s Day* on December 13. In Scandinavia, the celebration marks the start of the Christmas season and aims to spread happiness and joy.

Families celebrate St. Lucia’s Day at home by having one of their daughters dress in white and offer coffee and baked goodies to the other family members, such as saffron bread and ginger cookies.

History.com states that *Chinese New Year* is one of the most important celebrations of the year. The New Year typically begins with the first new moon that occurs between the end of January and spans the first 15 days of the lunar calendar. During the Chinese New Year, employees are given seven days off consecutively so they can join in parades, dances, games, and fireworks. Elders give out envelopes containing money to children. 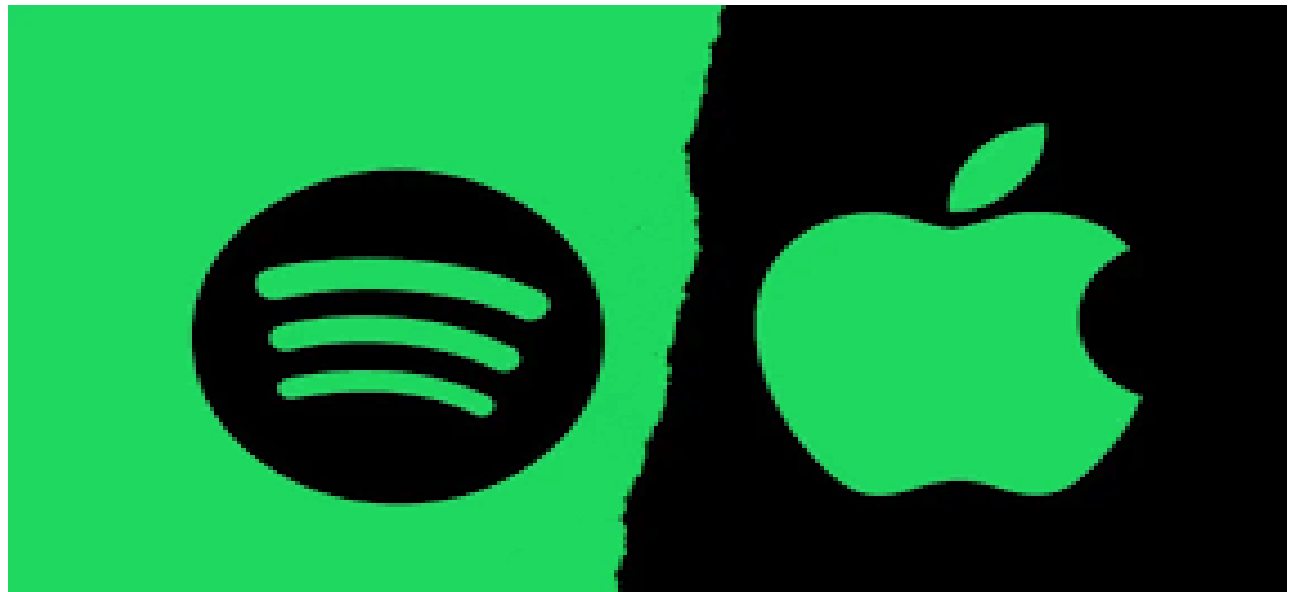

two innocent people. This sparked outrage among the west as Poland is a NATO nation, and as such, an attack on Poland is an attack on every NATO nation. This is not the only instance of a missile hitting a neutral nation as a Russian missile also struck the small Moldovan village of Naslavcea. This prompted Moldova, who isn't a NATO nation, to condemn the Russian strikes. Despite this, debris from another two Russian missiles landed in Moldovan territory. It is believed that a Russian missile was shot into Ukraine where it was shot out of the air by Ukrainian anti aircraft missile systems, causing the debris to land in Moldova. It doesn't just effect eastern Europe though, as Russia has been harassing

neutral Ireland by flying Bombers off its coasts, sending ships into their waters, and refusing to allow Ireland to teach Ukraine how to disarm and demine land mines and other indirect munitions. Russia stated that if Ireland chooses to teach demining, they will be an active participant in the war.

Russia has also shown they are not afraid of making threats directly to American citizens. Putin has actual encouraged acts of terror against American civilians because he feels acts of violence would discourage further U.S. involvement. Overall, it is important to remember that even if this conflict is thousands of miles away, no one is truly safe from its fallout and we may continue to see effects from this war.

7. GE Reagan Foundation Scholarship

Honoring the late president Ronald Reagan, this scholarship awards 20 students who display excellent leadership, drive, and integrity with up to \$40,000. It requires a 3.0 GPA or higher as well as plan to enroll in a full-time undergraduate course pursuing a bachelor's degree.

8. Ron Brown Scholarships Program

This scholarship honors the legacy of Ronald H. Brown and awards 50 African-American students with \$40,000 (\$10,000 annually). The award must be used to attend a four-year college or university. Applicants must exhibit leadership and excel academically.

9. Profile in Courage High School Awards

This scholarship is an essay contest that awards eight students \$10,000. The required essay prompt is to write an "original and creative essay that demonstrates an understanding

of political courage." The word count minimum is 700 words with a maximum of 1,000 words. The essay also requires a minimum of five sources, including government documents, interviews, and books. The deadline is January 13, 2023.

10. Howard County Arts Council Scholarship

This scholarship is for HCPSS students who would like to pursue a degree in the arts. The HCAC will award a minimum of \$10,000 to multiple select students.

There is no reason why people should be denied an education due to financial hardship, which is why many foundations create these scholarships. There are so many scholarships out there, some for lesser or more value than those listed above. OM has a document full of scholarships for seniors on the Student Services website in the Senior Folder. As the year goes on, scholarships specific to OM students will go out as well. Ms. DeMasi constantly updates them, so make sure to check that out!

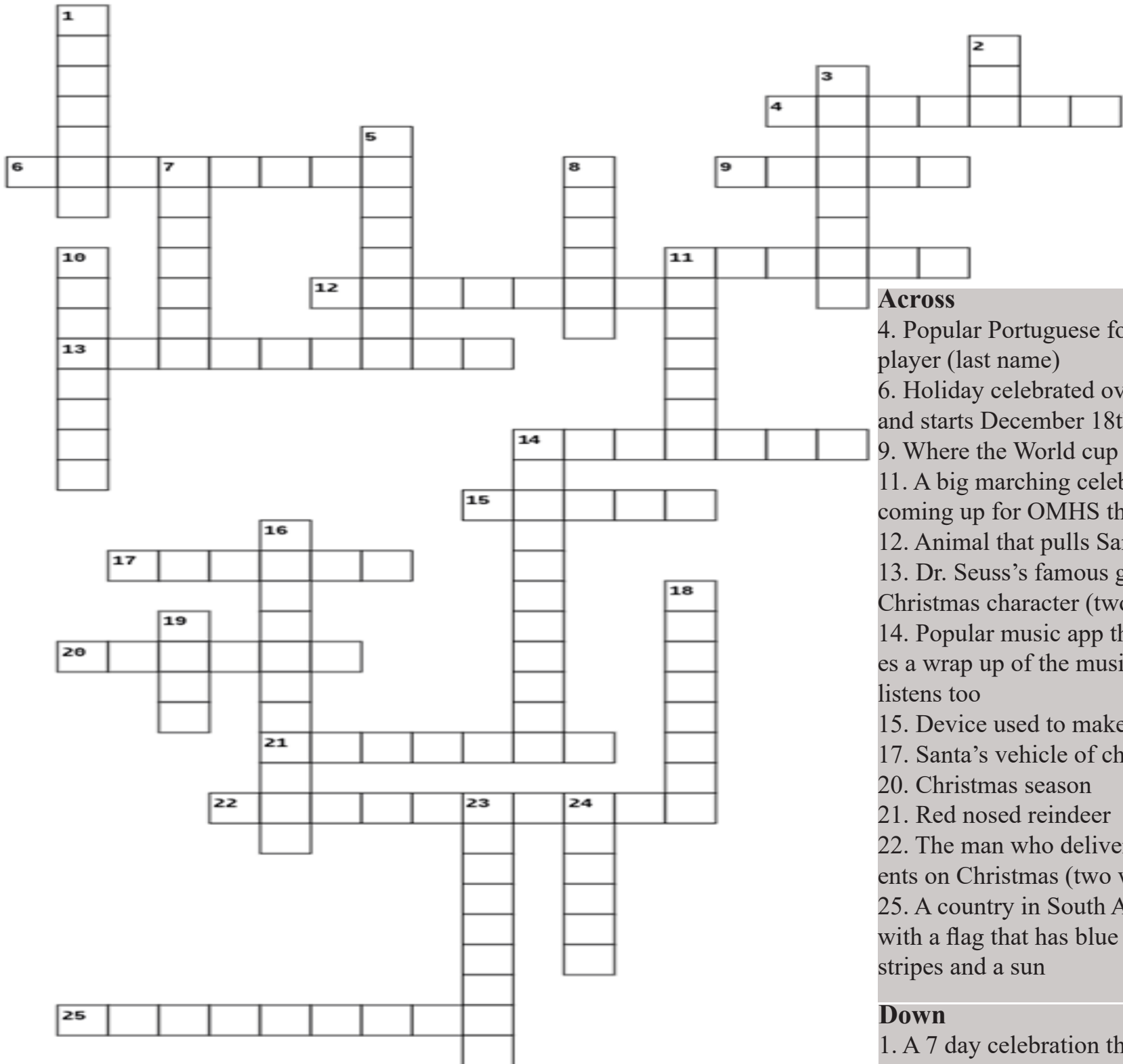
